Dream School Foundation Students Challenge the "Danger of a single story"

In a twenty-minute TED TALK video, The Danger of A Single Story, the novelist, Chimamanda Adichie describes the powerful impression the multitude of British stories made on her as a young girl growing up in Nigeria. She argues that inherent in the power of stories, is a danger—the danger of only knowing one story about a group. "The single story creates stereotypes, and the problem with stereotypes is not that they are untrue, but that they are incomplete. They make one story become the only story."

Is it their fault? No, we find out that most of this people who are into all this dirty jobs are into it because they couldn't feed their families and the only thing is to get into others people sweat and spoil it. Many people hustle in Nigeria just to stand out with others and also to make sure their children are well trained (My mother is also a good example , she work very hard to make sure we stand out good among others children) Same to others women's outside that hustle day and night to be well known in the society." **Omalara**
